College of Charleston Mission Statement














Graduate Student Headcount and FTE: Fall and Spring Semesters 2009-10 to 2013-14






Total Student Headcount and FTE: Fall and Spring Semesters 2009-10 to 2013-14




South Carolina Geographic Distribution Fall 2013





South Carolina Geographic Distribution Fall 2013









Retention Rates of First-time, Full-time Freshmen* Cohort Year 2008 to Cohort Year 2013





Graduation Rates of New Full-time Transfers Cohort Year 2003 to Cohort Year 2009


